## **CHAIR'S INTRODUCTION**

Our charity, the Special Educational Needs Advice Centre (SENAC) plays a vital role in providing practical information and advice on getting the right help and support in school for children with learning difficulties and special educational needs. From our inception in 2003, we have evolved and grown to deliver an independent service, ensuring children's rights and entitlements under the Special Educational Needs system are upheld and progressed and that decisions are based on the best interests of the child. The SENAC Board is pleased to present our Annual Report for the period 1 April 2018 to 31 March 2019.

Demand for our services has grown exponentially, with an ever-increasing need for support in schools for children with learning difficulties and special educational needs. The impact of budget cuts to the education sector has had considerable adverse impact on the level and type of support and assistance available to meet the needs of these children.

The increasing demand from families and carers for our help and involvement; the support provided to social services professionals and delivery of our projects and information services all led to a very busy year for our very dedicated team. We are proud to have supported a total of 1084 families in Northern Ireland during the reporting period.

During the year the team organised what proved to be a very successful conference on 'The Impact of Trauma on Care Experienced Children'. Feedback from attendees was very receptive and positive and we extend our thanks to our keynote speaker Louise Bomber, Trauma Specialist, who travelled over from England to contribute to the event.

SENAC does not receive any statutory funding and we rely on funding from grants applications, where successful; and from voluntary donations from the public. Our appreciation and thanks is extended to all who have supported SENAC financially throughout the year. We acknowledge that demand on funders has notably increased in recent years and that SENAC has to compete with other groups in the charitable sector seeking much-needed support.

We would like to include in our thanks Northern Ireland Fire & Rescue Service for facilitating car washes at Cadogan and Knock Fire Stations, raising over £1,350. Also, thanks to Ulster Rugby who accommodated two bucket collections outside the Kingspan Stadium during matches which raised £1,200. We would also like to give a special mention to all who supported us through the Belfast City Marathon which raised over £3,000.

Going forward, SENAC will only be able to continue its' services if we can maintain a secure financial position and it is a priority of the Board to continue striving for suitable funding streams. Our service delivery is only as good as the team behind it. The Board is incredibly proud of the SENAC team and the dedication and expertise of all involved. Each team member goes over and above to ensure as much as can be done as possible to support children in gaining access and the right support in education. The Board is also grateful everyone who has contributed during the year in a volunteer capacity.

#### SENAC CONFERENCE

The Impact of Trauma on Care Experienced Children and Young People and an Exploration of Strategies for Learning

In September, SENAC were delighted to welcome over 70 delegates from the Education and Health sectors to a conference on the 'Impact of Trauma on Care Experienced Children and Young People' at the Ivanhoe Hotel in Belfast.

Increasingly, we are learning of the impact of early trauma and adverse childhood experience and how such experience shapes and influences a child's life and learning. Awareness grows within health, education and government that greater consideration and understanding of the impact of childhood trauma must be applied in our interactions with children and the services and support we provide. This was particularly evident within our 'Every Chance to Learn' (ECL) project which supports the educational needs of care experienced children. To inform and raise awareness of the impact of trauma and provide information on initiatives and strategies to support learning was the motivation for our conference.

Led by Tracy Adams, SENAC's ECL Education Advocate the conference was an informative and educational day. We were delighted to welcome Louise Bombèr, Strategic Attachment Lead Teacher & Therapist and eminent author on Attachment who travelled from England to deliver the keynote presentation 'The Human Bridge Towards Recovery-Settling to Learn'. We were equally delighted to be joined by EJ Havlin, NI Director of Adoption UK and Sheila Lavery, Co-ordinator of TESSA (Therapeutic Education and Support Services in Adoption) who completed our line up of speakers.
