## **CHAIR'S INTRO**

On behalf of the SENAC Board, it gives me great pleasure to present our Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the period 1 April 2021 to 31 March 2022.

It was another period in which we played a key role in advancing the education of children and young people with special educational needs throughout Northern Ireland, despite facing many societal and economic headwinds.

Having grappled with the COVID-19 pandemic over the past couple of years, a global economic crisis has continued to make this an extremely challenging operating environment for all charity and community organisations. These pressures are also acutely felt by many of the families that we support, while schools are also facing very difficult challenges, with budget squeezes affecting their provision and priorities.

It is estimated that 1 in 4 children in Northern Ireland have special educational needs. Unfortunately, many children still do not have access to an education that meets their needs and demand for our services continues to be extremely high. During this reporting period, we supported 790 families through our Advice Line, Advocacy and Appeals services, an increase of 10% from the previous year.

The 39 community workshops and events we hosted, along with our new website, which was re-designed and re-launched in March 2021, are increasingly useful tool for parents and carers as they try to navigate the complex SEN system.

We had over 28,600 website visitors during this reporting period, which represents a 223% increase on the previous 12 months. This highlights the scale of challenge that we face, but also the important role SENAC can play for families who are looking for guidance and support.

As SENAC does not receive statutory funding, we are reliant on grants and charitable donations, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our funders and donors, whose support has been critical in sustaining our service provision.

Our dedicated and highly skilled staff team deserve immense credit for meeting the demands of their roles, and for doing so with a professional and child-centred approach. The same can be said for the Advice Line volunteers, who selflessly give up their time to help achieve better outcomes for the children we support.

I would like to thank my fellow Board members for their time and support over the past 12 months. We were delighted to appoint Aisleagh McConnell, who has expertise in several vital areas, as a very welcome addition to the Board. We also said farewell to Trustees; Bronach Doyle, Niall Adams, Joanna Gregg and Anna Ingram, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank them for their notable contributions.

SENAC will continue steadfastly in our mission to ensure children with special needs get the best chance to learn with the education provision necessary to support their needs. To fulfil this mission, it is imperative that we attract further funding and look to diversify income streams. This will be a priority in the coming years.

#### APPEALING TO SENDIST: ONLINE WEBINAR

This also provided an opportunity to share the findings of a survey SENAC carried out on the parental experience of SEN Appeals and a reflective analysis report on SENAC's Tribunal Service.
