### **CHAIR'S INTRO**

I am delighted to present the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the period spanning from 1 April 2022 to 31 March 2023, on behalf of the SENAC Board.

Once again, despite numerous societal and economic challenges, we have played a pivotal role in advancing the education of children and young people with special educational needs throughout Northern Ireland.

In the face of difficult funding conditions and the absence of a functioning government in Northern Ireland, operating as a charity has become increasingly demanding. These pressures have had a profound impact on the families we support, as well as the schools facing budget constraints that affect provision and priorities.

Regrettably, there are still many children who lack access to an education that adequately caters to their needs. Consequently, the demand for our services remains exceptionally high. During this reporting period, we provided support to 900 families through our Advice Line, Advocacy, and Appeals services - an impressive 14% increase compared to the previous year. The demand for all our services, which includes 44 workshops delivered to community and family support groups across Northern Ireland, has seen a significant rise. We commend our dedicated and highly skilled staff and volunteers for their unwavering commitment in meeting this escalating demand.

Our website continues to serve as an invaluable resource for parents and caregivers as they navigate the intricacies of the SEN system. With an average of over 5,000 unique visitors each month, it underscores the scale of the challenges we confront and reinforces the vital role SENAC plays in providing guidance and support to families.

In addition, we were proud to announce a successful partnership with Advice NI to implement a digital skills training programme specifically tailored for parents of children with SEN. This programme, funded by the Department of Health Carers Support Fund, marks a new chapter for us. Since its launch in Autumn 2022, it has been progressing very well.

I would like to take this opportunity to express our heartfelt appreciation to all our funders and donors, whose unwavering support has been paramount in sustaining our service provision.

I would also like to thank my fellow Board members for their invaluable time and unwavering support throughout the past 12 months. During this time, we bid farewell to Stephen Keery, and we extend our appreciation for his contributions.

Looking ahead, SENAC remains resolute in its mission to ensure that children with special educational needs are afforded the best support and opportunities to learn. To achieve this, we recognise the imperative need to attract additional funding and explore diversification of our income streams. This will be a top priority in the coming years, and we have already begun planning to recruit a Funding Development Officer to spearhead this new approach.

I would like to conclude by emphasising my sincere gratitude to the dedicated staff, volunteers, funders, and donors, whose active contributions have been instrumental in fostering long-term positive change for numerous children and their families.

"She advised us how to deal with things. She got in touch with the EA. As soon as she became involved everything got moving. It all fell into place. The assessment, then the Statement and then, the placement in a special school. My child has not missed a single day of school since they started."

"I had no one else. There were always obstacles in the way. The Appeals Officer was my eyes and my ears to help me through.

It is your child at the end of the day. They need your support and the younger they get the help the better for them later in life."

"It was so good to have someone giving you sound advice about all that we needed to present our case."
